## Gardening Delight

What a busy, busy week we've had! At this time of year, there is lots of treasure lying at our feet — leaves, sticks, acorns, conkers, sycamore keys. Deciduous trees drop their leaves to get ready for winter when they go into a kind of hibernation,

Leaves come in all shapes, sizes and colours – some of them look really


beautiful when you hold them up to the light, just like a stained-glass window!

Through the magnifying glass, you can see all the veins and patterns on a leaf. Some have serrated edges

like a knife, some are smooth and rounded and some have lobes (like your ear-lobe). On some leaves we saw evidence that insects had been there either eating or laying their eggs. We found lots of

similarities and differences to talk about — it's amazing how interesting natural treasure can be.
